

APPROVED HANDGUNS

Any service (Duty) weapons carried by a member while on duty will be semi-automatic 9mm caliber. Any commissioned member hired before January 1st, 2022, may keep their 40, or 45-caliber Duty handguns in service. Any commissioned member hired after January 1st, 2022, shall only place a 9mm caliber Duty weapon into service.

Authorized service weapon manufacturers include:

- Glock
- Colt
- Smith and Wesson
- Springfield Armory
- Sig Sauer (As of January 15th, 2023, all Sig Sauer P320 models, will no longer be authorized as an approved weapon)
- Shadow Systems
- Zev Technologies (models with adjustable triggers are not authorized)
- Staccato

Due to the many weapon variations and features each manufacturer offers, if a member wishes to carry a service weapon other than what is authorized above; using Guardian Tracking the member must request and receive written permission from the Professional Standards Captain stating the exact make, model, finish/color, and any attachments of the pistol they wish to carry as a service weapon. Attaching a photo is highly recommended.

As it applies to handguns, the Office will maintain the ability to provide armorer service for Glock, brand weapons. If a member chooses to carry another brand of service weapon or secondary weapon, the yearly armoring expense will be the responsibility of the member as P&P B-106 – Use of Authorized Lethal Weapons 11 of 15 outlined in Section III B.

Approved secondary weapons include:

- Glock
- Colt
- Smith and Wesson
- Springfield Armory
- Sig Sauer (As of January 15th, 2023, all Sig Sauer P320 models, will no longer be authorized as an approved weapon)
- Shadow Systems
- Zev Technologies (models with adjustable triggers are not authorized)
- Staccato
- Ruger (revolver only)

in .380 automatic, .38 special/357, (revolver), and 9mm, .40, or .45 caliber. caliber (if a commissioned member was hired before January 1st, 2022, they may keep their 40, or 45-caliber secondary handguns in service). Any commissioned member hired after January 1st, 2022, shall only place a .380 automatic, 38 special/ 357, (revolver), and 9mm caliber secondary weapons into service.

Due to the many weapon variations and features each manufacturer offers, if a member wishes to carry a secondary weapon, other than what is authorized above: using Guardian Tracking the member must request and receive written permission from the Professional Standards Captain stating the exact make, model, finish/color, and any attachments of the pistol they wish to carry as a secondary weapon. Attaching a photo is highly recommended.

Authorized Equipment (or Modifications):

Authorized weapons may have the following attachments, which do not affect the overall mechanical function of the weapons or compromise the internal or external safeties of the firearm.

- Extended magazine release.
- High visibility sights (night sights).
- Ambidextrous safeties.
- Extended magazines with base plate.

- Tactical lights (lasers not allowed).
- Evolution One Zero MK 2, Parker Mountain Machine, and Radian Ramjet compensators are authorized if factory installed (or by a certified department armorer and notated on the Authorized Weapon Sheet).

Using Guardian Tracking the member must request and receive written permission from the Professional Standards Captain for any other color or finish variable (other than black) for an authorized weapon.

Approved Red dot pistol sights:

- \bullet Trijicon RMR Type 2 1MOA-3.25MOA (optic must be capable of manual brightness adjustments).
- Holosun (optic must be capable of manual brightness adjustments).
- Steiner MPS 3.3 MOA (optic must be capable of manual brightness adjustments).

P&P B-106 – Use of Authorized Lethal Weapons 12 of 15

 Sig Sauer Romeo/ Pro 3.0 MOA (optic must be capable of manual brightness adjustments).

All handguns utilizing a red dot sight must have suppressor height backup sights or RDS height backup sights (unless the system allows the use of the original sights). Commissioned members are strongly encouraged to use a reputable/ durable optic adapter plate and are encouraged to replace their optic batteries once a year.

All commissioned personnel will complete the DCSO red dot transition course training from a certified firearms instructor and demonstrate proficiency in the use of the red dot sight prior to placing the firearm into service.

Deputies who have completed the HRLETA Academy with their red dot sight are exempt from completing the DCSO red dot transition course
